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

Numerous requests from carers to have events to support their unique needs

- recognize carers are important contributors to the care of a person receiving mental health care in custodial/forensic environments.
- No road map for carers where/who to go to contact
- limited/no support structure in place to meet these carers specific needs
- qualitative data (F&C Survey's) indicated that carers were wanting such a network: in a safe and supportive environment......




CNE occurred......






Then came COVID.....
